

Current Labour Force and Characteristics

- The City of Mississauga is part of the largest labour force market in Canada, the Greater Toronto Area (GTA). Within the GTA, employees can be recruited from a large population base of over 4.3 million people aged 15 years and above.
- Because of the magnitude and diversity of the industrial and commercial base located in Mississauga, this city has become one of the most significant employment growth centres within the GTA. In 2017, 90,780 businesses in Mississauga employed 438,168 people.

Employment Statistics

- In 2017, Mississauga's population was 770,000 and had an employment ratio of .57 which means that for every 100 residents of the city, there were 57 local jobs.
- Mississauga has a participating resident labour force of more than 421,172 people.

Payroll Overhead/Fringe Benefits
